Pastor Travis' Thoughts

Beautiful People,

This month, we will begin a new sermon series that will focus on the Gospel of Mark. I look forward to exploring together the life and teachings of Jesus. Often we jump around and highlight certain Jesus stories, but never spend the time looking in depth and what Jesus did and taught. We call ourselves “Disciples of Christ”, and this will be our chance to get to know better the Christ we serve. And Mark will be an inspiring and convicting gospel on this journey.

We are calling our series “Good News”, partly because the word “gospel” literally means “good news” and partly because Jesus begins this gospel by proclaiming to the crowds, “Believe the good news!” But we are also calling it “Good News” because we need some good news in our lives. So much we hear today is about what is wrong with our country, our churches and our selves. We are inundated with Bad News. But Jesus came to proclaim Good News, and the Gospel of Mark is filled with it.

Mark is the oldest gospel in the New Testament. Most of the epistles (letters) in the New Testament were written first, and then the early Christians decided to record and preserve the stories of Jesus and his teachings. Scholars believed that there were other documents here and there written about Jesus, but never put together in a book. Then the writer of Mark came along, gathered those pieces, interviewed other people to hear their stories, and arranged them all into the book we have today. Later, when Matthew and Luke wrote their Gospels, they used Mark along with other sources to write their Gospels, which is why these three books have similar structure and material. The last Gospel to be written was John, and it is nothing like the other three.

Mark is the shortest of the Gospels. The writer tells the story quickly, and his most repeated word is “immediately.” Mark doesn’t tell us about the birth of Jesus. The story begins with John the Baptist, baptizing the crowds and, soon, Jesus. Before chapter 1 ends, Jesus has been baptized, tempted in the wilderness, called his first disciples, healed three people and begun a traveling teaching ministry. This gospel is a fast-moving story that follows a fast-moving Messiah, who moves from town to town, sharing the good news as people quickly respond to his message. But just as quickly as Jesus gathers followers, he also gathers

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opposition. The religious leaders who feel threatened by Jesus' ministry are already plotting Jesus' demise by chapter 2.

The question Mark asks of his readers is this: will you follow Jesus? It seems like an easy question, but throughout the gospel those who say, "Yes," to Jesus are often the ones most disappointed in the way Jesus leads. Jesus' closest Disciples do not get what he's teaching. His family doesn't understand. The masses say they want to follow Jesus, but then argue with him about where he is leading them, and by the end, none of them are standing with him. They want a Messiah, but on their terms, not Jesus'.

As we read Mark together, we will have our own expectations of Jesus challenged. Why are we following Christ? Are we dictating to Jesus the path we should go, or are we following Jesus wherever he may lead? Are we content to be a disciple, so long as our lives are left alone and we are not challenged, or are we willing to enter this new world of "Good News", where everything is turned upside down. This gospel will not allow us to sit on the sidelines or be lukewarm in our commitment to Christ. Jesus brings us good news, good news that will change the world--and change us--forever. I pray our lives and our church will be forever changed by what we encounter in the Gospel of Mark.

Sometimes our flowers spread and multiply and then our flower beds get too full. They get so packed with flowers that none of them are able to fully bloom to their potential, as they were intended. It is possible to have too much of a good thing. That's true in our lives too. We need to make sure we have enough space for the good things in our lives to be able to grow to their full potential. And sometimes that means cutting back on other good things. Passing them off to others and allowing others to grow into their full potential so we too can grow into our full potential.

Blessings to each of us as we find ways to grow full and healthy lives together.

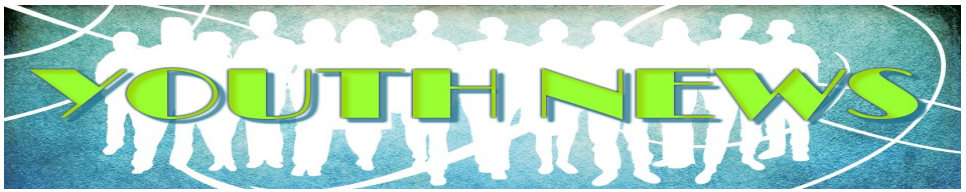

Hearing Assistance Now Available in Worship

Did you know our church is now equipped with top-of-the-line hearing assistance technology called a "hearing loop". If you need hearing assistance during worship, there are two things you can do. If you have an hearing aid, you can receive the best results by switching your hearing aid to the "Telecoil (T-Coil) setting". If you do not know what this is, or if your hearing aid has the setting, contact your audiologist today. With this setting, you will be able to hear the entire worship service directly in your hearing aid, eliminating background sound. If you do not have a hearing aid or do not yet have your T-Coil setup, we have hearing packs available at our sound booth in the back of the sanctuary. Village of Santa Emelia, Nicaragua

In my article in the March Newsletter I told you about my experiences on the mission trip to Nicaragua in early February. Our former pastor, Pat Nixon has been traveling to Nicaragua twice a year for the past nine years. The primary mission of his group, *Amigos de Santa Emelia (Friends of Santa Emelia)*, is to assist in education and medical care for this village. *There are currently two projects that are in progress that the group is assisting with.*

The first project is a medical clinic that will be built and operated by the Nicaraguan government. This clinic will serve nine communities in the area and will house a doctor, nurse, and ambulance. This will significantly improve both routine and urgent medical care for this region. But the village must provide the land for the clinic, and they have no money to buy it. There may be some funds provided by the coffee plantation, the area's prime employer, and other local private donors. The Amigos group is hoping to assist in the funding of this land purchase.

The other project is to build another classroom at the village school. The Amigos plan to break ground for this new building when they return in July. Their target for fund raising for these two projects is \$8,500. So far the amount received and pledged is about \$5,000. If you are interested in providing financial assistance to these *Amigos de Santa Emelia mission projects*, you can contact Pastor Pat to get further information.
