Beautiful People,

A few Sunday's ago, I shared the parable of the "Easter Chicken". I've talked to more than a few of you about this story and it's meaning since it's telling, so I thought I'd share it again and explain it in more detail.

It's a story told by the old southern civil rights pastor, Will D. Campbell, in his autobiography Brother to a Dragonfly. As the story goes, Campbell is talking with a friend of his, an agnostic newspaper reporter named P.D. East. Everytime P.D. East would talk to Campbell, he'd ask him how his church was doing. But he didn't call the church, "Church", he called it an Easter Chicken. The story is told in Campbell's first person voice, and I've edited it for length and language.

Each time I saw him [P.D. East] he would ask, "And what's the state of the Easter chicken, Preacher Will?" I knew he was trying to goad me into some kind of an argument and decided to wait him out. One day he explained.

"You know, Preacher Will, that Church of yours and Mr. Jesus is like an Easter chicken my little Karen got one time. Man, it was a pretty thing. Dyed a deep purple. Bought it at the grocery store."

I interrupted that white was the liturgical color for Easter but he ignored me. "And it served a real useful purpose. Karen loved it. It made her happy. And that made me and her Mamma happy.... But pretty soon that baby chicken started feathering out. ... And you know what? Them new feathers weren't purple. No sirree bob, that ... chicken wasn't really purple at all. [She] was a Rhode Island Red. And when all them little red feathers started growing out from under that purple it was one [heck] of a sight. All of a sudden Karen couldn't stand that chicken any more...."

"Well, we took that half-purple and half-red thing out to her Grandma's house and threw it in the chicken yard with all the other chickens. It was still different, you understand. That little chicken. And the other chickens knew it was different. And they resisted it.... Pecked it, chased it all over the yard. Wouldn't have anything to do with it. Wouldn't even let it get on the roost with them. And that little chicken knew it was different too. It didn't bother any of the others. Wouldn't fight back or anything. Just stayed by itself. Really suffered too.

But little by little, day by day, that chicken came around. Pretty soon, even before all the purple grew off it, while it was still just a little bit different, that ... thing was behaving just about like the rest of them chickens. Man, it would fight back, peck ... the ones littler than it was, knock them down to catch a bug if it got to it in time. Yes sirree bob, the chicken world turned that Easter chicken around. And now you can't tell one chicken from another. They're all just alike. The Easter chicken is just one more chicken. There ain't a [dang] thing different about it."


I knew he wanted to argue and I didn't want to disappoint him. "Well, P. D., the Easter chicken is still useful. It lays eggs, doesn't it?"

It was what he wanted me to say. "Yea, Preacher Will. It lays eggs. But they all lay eggs. Who needs an Easter chicken for that? And the Rotary Club serves coffee. And the 4-H Club says prayers. The Red Cross takes up offerings for hurricane victims. Mental Health does counseling, and the Boy Scouts have youth programs."

The interpretation of the parable, as I see it, is that the agnostic P.D. East sees the church as being like that Easter Chicken he once gave his daughter. The church is a unique and special community, at first, but over time it has become just like the rest of the world, indistinguishable from the other "chickens". If all the church does is serve coffee, say prayers, take up offerings for those in need, offers counseling and have youth programs, then how is it really any different than other do-good community groups? What's so good about an Easter Chicken that can do nothing but lay eggs like the rest of the chickens?

As we read through the Gospel of Mark together, we continually find a Jesus that is very much different than the world around him. Jesus is not like P.D. East's Easter Chicken. Last week we heard the amazement of the people, that Jesus taught--and with authority! That is, he not only spoke the truth, but he lived it out, declaring the Kingdom of God has come near through his words and his actions. This is the mission of the church. This is what we should be about. We are here not just to serve coffee, say prayers and take up an offering. We are here to changes lives for Christ!

How has your life been changed by Norwalk Christian Church? How are you changing others lives and changing our world for Christ? If you've got a story to share, send it to me. We want to hear your Good News! And may our church resist the temptation to become just like every other chicken in the yard. May we be bold in our uniqueness as we follow the One who turned the world upside down.

If I continue doing the same thing year after year, I become stagnant, lacking strength or encouragement. I am grateful for these times of weeding, both in my yard and in my life. For through weeding I find new ways of refilling and energizing my soul.



Hearing Assistance Now Available in Worship

Did you know our church is now equipped with top-of-the-line hearing assistance technology called a "hearing loop". If you need hearing assistance during worship, there are two things you can do. If you have a

hearing aid, you can receive the best results by switching your hearing aid to the "Telecoil (T-Coil) setting". If you do not know what this is, or if your hearing aid has the setting, contact your audiologist today. With this setting, you will be able to hear the entire worship service directly in your hearing aid, eliminating background sound. If you do not have a hearing aid or do not yet have your T-Coil setup, we have hearing packs available at our sound booth in the back of the sanctuary. As an educator for the past 35 years during the month of May I focused on my seniors' graduation. I was recently sent an article by former Stanford University Dean Julie Lythcott-Haims, which states the eight life skills she feels every 18 - year-old needs to have to be successful.

After reading this article l know there are young people who have some of these skills, but many of them don't. I thought it would be good for us as parents to be reminded of these life skills that we take for granted every day and the importance of them.

#1. An 18-year-old must be able to talk to strangers.

Faculty, deans, advisors, landlords, human resource managers, health care providers, mechanics - people they will encounter in real life.

*The crutch- We teach kids not to talk to strangers instead of teaching them the skill of how to discern the few bad strangers from the many good ones. Thus kids end up not knowing how to approach strangers- respectfully and with eye contact- for guidance and direction they will need out in the real world.

#2. An 18-year-old must be able to find his or her way around.

A new campus, the town where his summer internship is located, a city where he or she is working or studying abroad.

*The crutch- We drive or accompany them everywhere, even when a bus, their bike or their feet could get them there. Thus kids don't know routes to get from point A to point B (especially if their smart phone is dead). How do they determine transportation options or cope with snafus when Dad and Mom are 6 hours away?

#3. An 18-year-old must be able to manage his or her own assignments, workload and deadlines.

*The crutch- Parents, teachers or technology remind kids when their homework is due and when to do it. Sometimes we help them with it or do it for them. Thus kids don't know how to prioritize tasks, manage workload, or meet deadlines without regular reminders.

Bosses and college professors rarely give extensions or redos.

#4. An 18-year-old must be able to contribute to the running of the household.

*The crutch- We don't ask them to help much around the house because of their overcrowded schedules. There is little time in the day outside of academic and extracurricular work. Kids don't know how to look after their own needs, respect the needs of others, or do their fair share for the good of the whole.

- #5. An 18-year-old must be able to handle interpersonal problems.
- *The crutch- We step in to solve misunderstandings and soothe hurt feelings for them. Thus kids don't know how to cope with and resolve conflicts without our intervention.
- #6. An 18-year-old must be able to cope with ups and downs.

Courses and workloads, college-level work, competition, tough teachers, bosses and others.

*The crutch- We step in when things get hard, finish the task, extend the deadlines, and talk to the adults in charge to make it better. Thus kids don't know that in the normal course of life things won't always go their way, and that they'll be okay regardless.

#7. An 18-year-old must be able to earn and manage money.

*The crutch- Many don't hold part-time jobs. They receive money from us for whatever they want. Thus kids don't develop a sense of responsibility for completing tasks, accountability to a boss who doesn't inherently love them, an appreciation for the cost of things or how to manage what they do earn.

#8. An 18-year-old must be able to take risks.

*The crutch- We've laid out their entire path for them and have avoided all pitfalls or prevented all stumbles for them. Thus kids don't develop the wise understanding that success comes after trying and failing and trying again (grit) or the thick skin (resilience) that comes from coping when things have gone wrong.
